The trustees, who are also the directors for the purposes of company law, present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021

#### Chair's report

It hardly needs to be said that the Coronavirus outbreak has brought about considerable changes to our daily lives. This created considerable hardship for some of our most vulnerable people, and the reduction in services impacted on disabled people in various ways. Many disabled people are highly dependent on face-to-face services, often involving physical contact, so they have been disproportionately affected by preventative measures such as social distancing.

The very concept of social distancing is problematic for the many people with sight loss who cannot see other people and who require physical guiding in unfamiliar spaces. Evidence exists that blind people have been verbally attacked for accidentally breaking social distancing rules. Guide dogs, for example, are not able to socially distance, and this has resulted in confrontations with other members of the public.

Wales Council of the Blind continued to work throughout the year, with no staff being furloughed, providing information and support to its members, professionals and individuals throughout the pandemic, and addressing some of the concerns that people have expressed.

The trustees are grateful to the staff and volunteers for adapting to the situation and maintaining a service throughout this difficult time. Each of them moved their work to their homes at the start of the pandemic and continued core activities, including helping smaller groups to continue supporting their members through Zoom meetings and conference calls.

At the beginning of the pandemic we were concerned about our funding streams. The pandemic halted talks with some funders as their priorities changed. Ironically, the various relief funds for voluntary sector organisations hit by the pandemic saved us from having to dip into our reserves. With the addition of project funding from Welsh Government we could carry on. I believe that the work WCB carried out during the pandemic strengthened our role and has helped us to secure a Welsh Government grant for next year, one that focuses on our core roles of information provision, supporting the sight loss sector, and representing people with sight loss.

I would also like to thank my fellow trustees for their work and support during the year.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Wales Council of the Blind is the independent umbrella agency for vision impairment in Wales representing blind and partially sighted people and the clubs and societies who support them. Our independence also enables us to act as an impartial observer, advocate, intermediary and evaluator for this complex, diverse group of organisations and services. In carrying out our charitable objectives, services to people with sight loss are improved.

We gather the opinions and views of people with sight loss through groups and consultation. We put their voice at the centre of what we do, reporting on their views to the people who are responsible for the services that help them. We also act as an agency to direct people to these services, giving them impartial advice and choice.

The trustees confirm that they complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard for the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

WCB staff continued to work from home according to Welsh Government advice. As restrictions have eased, staff have been sharing their time between home and office.

Here is an account of the WCB work-streams for the year.

#### Information services

In addition to informal support via telephone and email, WCB provided the following information services.

#### Website www.wcb-ccd.org.uk.

This is the focal point of our information provision and hosts, or provides access to, the following media:

Sylw, a weekly bulletin distributed via email and on the website. It is also produced in alternative formats monthly and distributed by post. The weekly e-bulletin reached over 2,900 recipients whilst the monthly edition was delivered to over 450 individuals with sight loss who would not have access via the web or email.

Roundup, a quarterly magazine that provides a space for a fuller exploration of themes from the perspective of sight loss. Sent via email, post and available online. Roundup is circulated quarterly via email, social media, large print and audio to over 3,300.

Perspectif, a database of services and other resources. This shall be overhauled in 2021-22 to improve its functionality and content.

Our social media has continued through Twitter and Facebook. We currently have over 1,800 Twitter followers.

We would like to thank our volunteers, Ann and Dewi, for their unstinting support for our information services.

#### Covid information resources

A specifically-funded project aimed to deliver accessible information to a hard-to-reach group - people with sight loss who would not necessarily have access to the ordinary channels of communication such as the internet. It provided information on changes to services in the domains of Retail, Education, Social Care and Health, Employment, and Transport / travel.

The funding enabled us also to share information about Government restrictions and guidance concerning the pandemic for people with sight loss and those who work with them, alongside updates on support available in the community such as medicine collection, food delivery and events taking place online. We produced a series of newsletters - online, in print, and in audio. We also produced a set of regional (by local authority) information resources, similarly in accessible media.

We established weekly meetings of the Wales Vision Forum - an informal group of sight loss organisations and people with sight loss - in which we discussed any developments and updates on service provision to be included in the newsletters and online. Since our service users are people with sight loss who, in this situation, were considered vulnerable and often needed to 'shield', it was important that we directed our efforts towards serving their immediate needs. Through these meetings we were able to listen to the community to develop a good awareness of the situation as it developed.

We learned how it was possible to galvanize support from our sector very quickly. The project has identified a way forward for us so that we can concentrate on our information provision and let our members get on with service delivery. We now see ourselves as the glue joining services to service users in an environment where people are often in the dark about what is available to them in their communities.

#### **Conversations that Count**

Another project that related to the Covid pandemic was a collaboration with Frame Collective. For Conversations That Count, Wales Council of the Blind identified people who wanted to share their pandemic experiences. In autumn 2020, Frame Collective spoke with fourteen people with sight loss, aged in their 'twenties to 'seventies. Everyone's stories and circumstances were different, but many of the struggles were similar. How people had coped varied widely and seemed to depend on sustaining connection with others, accessing support and maintaining some

independence. Some people were better resourced and more resilient than others. Loneliness and isolation were prominent topics of conversation.

#### Establishing a Certificate of Visual Impairment for Primary Care

A CVI task and finish group was established through the WECS join committee to look at scoping, developing and delivering certification by low vision accredited practitioners. WCB chaired this group and a paper was signed off and sent to Welsh Government for consideration and rollout.

This initiative would give patients the choice to receive the CVI from their high street optometrist. We hope this would give them quicker access to support services, particularly patients with dry AMD who would not necessarily need to visit the ophthalmologist.

This work will be carried forward by the Low Vision Advisory Group, which WCB chairs.

#### **Networks**

Wales Council of the Blind ensures that the voice of people with sight loss in Wales is represented in various networks. We sit on a number of networks including:

- Wales Rehabilitation Officers Forum.
- Wales Disability Reference Group.
- Cross Party Groups on Vision and Disability.
- Disability Equality Framework.
- Low Vision Service Wales Advisory Group: our CEO, in his capacity as Chair, sits on the Wales Eye Care Service Joint Committee.
- Welsh Government's Loneliness and Social Isolation Group.
- All-Wales Sensory Loss Information and Communication Group.

#### **Support for members**

#### Accessible media

Wales Council of the Blind produces its materials, and that of member organisations, in accessible formats - notably large print and audio CDs.

All editions of Sylw, Roundup and RESET were produced in audio, electronic and large print formats. Newsletters produced for Visual Impairment Merthyr, Radnorshire Association for the Blind, and Visual Impairment Breconshire. At the end of the year we started to write and transcribe newsletters for Ceredigion Association for the Blind.

#### Supporting local organisation

Our Engagement Officer sits on a number of local societies and provides a combination of secretarial support, newsletters, accessible media, and governance. We provided administrative support and telephone conference facilities to a number of member organisations.

#### **Regional Forums**

These are where individuals with sight loss are able to share their views and, to some extent, direct WCB's agenda. Under the current Covid restrictions, these have met with some success via telephone. Given the geographical spread of the regions, WCB may continue to convene these meetings via telephone or as virtual meetings. We have valued the input of these groups into our organisational responses to consultations. They have been instrumental in influencing change. As an independent organisation we we provide a crucial platform through which people are able to express themselves freely.

#### **Wales Vision Forum**

WCB chairs and provides secretariat for the Wales Vision Forum. The purpose of the Forum is for national, local and specialist organisations representing people with sight loss to come together to share, discuss and outline work programmes and priorities.

The Forum is a platform for sharing information, sharing good practice and expertise, consulting and identifying opportunities to support service and campaign planning.

WCB was responsible for establishing weekly emergency meetings during the Covid pandemic, leading to an information resource to ensure that Welsh Government messages go out in an accessible form to people with sight loss. This became a fortnightly meeting, alternating between broad themes and the work of the Eye Care Collaboration Groups (ECGs).

During this year WCB established a task and finish group to look at the scarcity of the rehabilitation workforce across Wales.

#### Visionary

Certain WCB members are also Visionary members. Visionary is the UK umbrella organisation for local societies serving people with sight loss. WCB is the representative for Wales on Visionary's Members' Consultative Group (MCG). This is an opportunity to extend the reach of the voice of local societies into the UK agenda.

WCB's CEO is currently Chair of Visionary

# Wales Disability Reference Group (WDRG)

Wales Council of the Blind joined other national disability organisations to raise concerns about the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on disabled people living with pre-existing medical conditions.

Report has subsequently been published.

#### **Cross-party Group on Disability**

Four meetings were held and the following items were discussed:

- Wearing face masks
- Structural barriers to intimate relationships
- Roadmap out of lockdown & disabled people
- £500 Care worker payment
- The effect of the coronavirus pandemic on people with learning disabilities
- Shielding and accessible information

At the request of Welsh Government, Wales Council of the Blind and Wales Council for Deaf People worked together to produce a document on making meetings accessible for people with sensory loss. This document was shared with WCVA and its members, as well as with the Disability Equality Forum. It was also shared with the Welsh Government 'Accessible Communications Group'.

#### Welsh Rehabilitation Officers' Forum

WCB continued to support WROF with funds to commission specialist training for members along with paying the membership for every ROVI in Wales for the Rehabilitation Workers Professional Network.

#### Rehabilitation services for people with sight loss

WCB was commissioned by Welsh Government to look at the state of current provision of rehabilitation services across Wales. Due to interruptions in services brought on by Covid, the project had to be continued into the following financial year. At the time of writing, the reports have been completed and submitted to Welsh Government. There is a scarcity of officers which will get worse if action is not taken to train and recruit more. The report includes a recommendation for a Wales-based Rehabilitation Foundation Degree.

#### **WCB Storm**

The WCB Storm project, for young people with sight loss, ended in the previous year but we intend to continue some of the work, notably the newsletter. We would like to thank Megan Price for volunteering to help us in producing these during this year. Unfortunately for us, Megan secured full-time employment which meant she was unavailable for volunteering. We shall hopefully continue the newsletters with the aid of a new volunteer.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

With the ending of the financial year, the Board of trustees report a year-end financial position of a surplus of £32,769 compared to deficit of £38,649 in 2020. The Welsh Government funding has continued through the year.

WCB's reserves policy is fully met and we have sufficient funds to plan for the future.

Unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £285,345 (2020: £249,476) with free reserves of £57,329 (2020: £44,002).

#### **Investment Policy**

Under articles of association then charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. The present policy is to keep an amount that represents short term operating requirements in liquid deposits (bank deposit accounts) and place the balance in the hands of a professional investment broker, to invest in wide range of fixed interest and equity funds. During the period 2015/16 the charity invested £200,000 with Quilter Cheviot as part of a Discretionary Managed Portfolio at a lower to medium tolerance of risk. WCB's investment objective is to grow the capital of the portfolio, as well as generating some degree of income. At the yearend WCB's managed portfolio was valued at £227,776. This was a net gain of £22,662 on the previous year. This will continue to be invested.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees have considered carefully the purpose of any reserved Wales Council of the Blind has or might have in the future. The stated aim of the reserves policy is to allow for unforeseeable events. This could be anything from replacing essential office equipment, to the sudden loss of funding. The amount should be sufficient to pay for staff redundancies and outstanding liabilities.

Reserves should be maintained at a level of 6 months operating costs of the core organisation. In addition, we may need to recognise any longer-term grant / project commitments and to settle the finances accordingly. Reserves should exclude funding that has been restricted for other specified use.

Reserves should be invested in a safe, low risk environment that maintains the capital invested and where possible provides a level of return on those funds.

The policy is reviewed annually by Trustees, or more frequently as necessary.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

WCB was awarded a grant of £105k for 2021/22. This will enable WCB to carry out its core function. We will also discuss restarting the Thomas Pocklington Trust project now that Covid restrictions are easing.

We will be seeking funding for a project to expand the use of Perspectif by Low Vision Service Wales practitioners as part of their role to signpost patients to support in their communities. This support is often provided by member organisations, so this project seeks to direct people to that support. We have had discussions a researcher who will, we hope, be conducting research into its efficacy. With optometry reform in Wales we will see more patients being diagnosed and treated on the high street therefore providing information on further support is a crucial part of the low vision practitioner's role.

We will explore funding for this project to be sustained indefinitely.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

# **Governing Document**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and as such is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company was incorporated on 31 January 1991 under the Companies Act 1985 and registered as a charity on 18 April 1995.

# Recruitment and Appointment of the Management Committee

The directors of the company also serve as trustees of the charity and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Trustees are appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting. Casual vacancies are filled by the Management Committee and ratified at the next Annual General Meeting.

Each member of the Management Committee has agreed to guarantee the company's debts for the amount of £1 each.

All new Trustees are given induction training via the issuing of our organisational policy and procedures book and WCB offers to arrange for Trustees to have the opportunity to attend Trustee training provided by Wales Council for Voluntary Action (WCVA) should they wish. Trustees are able to contact the Council's secretary if they wish to have specific advice or guidance on any policies or procedures. WCB provides Trustees with indemnity insurance to the value of £500,000.

Our Engagement Officer, Rebecca Phillips, facilitates and organises the Regional Steering Groups, as well as enables the voice of people with sight loss to be heard.

WCB has a dedicated team of volunteers who we would like to thank, providing invaluable support to the organisation around information gathering, keeping our database up-to-date and updating our Twitter feed, collating the material for Roundup, providing help with fundraising, answering the telephone and providing advice. Thank you, Ann, Dewi, Alan and Valmai for your continued support. We would also like to thank Bethan Smale our bookkeeper for all of her hard work.

#### Year ended 31 March 2021

#### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England & Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Hastings House, Fitzalan Place, Unit 2.2, Cardiff, CF24 0BL.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

After making reasonable enquiries and having considered the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and other factors on the financial performance of the charity and its current performance, the Trustee's believe that the charity will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable purpose, will be able to meet its liabilities as they fall due, and will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in in in preparing the financial statements

# Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the purposes of the charity. Unrestricted funds include a revaluation reserve representing the restatement of investment assets at market values.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

#### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the
  delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds
  unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular
  purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as
  restricted.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

#### **Tangible assets**

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Fixed assets are not capitalised where the cost is below £100.

#### **Depreciation**

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Office equipment

25% reducing balance

#### Investments

Unlisted equity investments are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently measured at fair value. If fair value cannot be reliably measured, assets are measured at cost less impairment.

Listed investments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value being recognised in income or expenditure.

# Debtors and creditors receivable/ payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

#### Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument. Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted. Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Where investments in shares or preference shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

#### **Defined contribution plans**

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

#### 4. Limited by guarantee

Each member of the Board of Trustees has undertaken to guarantee the Council's debts to the sum of £1 each.
